



## Workshop from Home with Amy Brummond of Pine Zen Pottery Resources for October 18, 2022

- Brummond's studio is in a shed on her property and is approximately 175 square feet.
- Her primary clay body is Red Bclay (WC438) from Laguna Clay Company (www.lagunaclay.com/product-page/wc438-red-b-mix-w-grog).
- She uses the "An Oxidized Bisque Firing" schedule from Pottery Making Illustrated's
  July/August 2018 issue (<a href="https://ceramicartsnetwork.org/pottery-making-illustrated/pottery-making-illustrated-article/An-Oxidized-Bisque-Firing">https://ceramicartsnetwork.org/pottery-making-illustrated-article/An-Oxidized-Bisque-Firing</a>)
- She glaze fires to cone 5.
- Brummond uses Amaco velvet underglazes (<u>www.amaco.com/t/glazes-and-underglazes/underglaze/velvet-underglaze/velvet-underglazes</u>).
- She uses commercial glazes. Her favorite glazes are from Spectrum and Amaco.

- Brummond is exclusively a hand builder, although she started out on a kick wheel.
- She is the one woman show behind Pine Zen Pottery. Although her husband helps quite a bit at update time. He sands all the work and helps with packing and shipping.

## **Favorite Studio Tools:**

- North Star tabletop slab roller that can be dissembled and stored underneath worktable (<u>www.northstarequipment.com/ttslab.htm</u>)
- Slab Mat (by StoneLeaf pottery) Used in place of canvas when rolling out slabs—22 by 60, folded in half to feed clay through the slab roller (https://slabmat.com).
- Arkon mount to hold phone to record videos, and ring light that attaches to phone for better lighting (<a href="https://a.co/d/7qBqAqx">https://a.co/d/7qBqAqx</a>)
- Bluetooth speaker (Got to have music, podcasts, and audio books)

- Upholstery foam
- Shimpo banding wheel (www.dickblick.com/products/nidec-shimpo-banding-wheels)
- Mudtools red and yellow rib. Cannot live without these.

- Mudtools leaf drawing rib (edge 4 tight angle) This is used for scoring.

- Mudtools sponges are a favorite (<a href="https://mudtools.com/collections/sponges-1">https://mudtools.com/collections/sponges-1</a>)
- Wooden paddle. Both Garrity paddle and Dirty Girls paddle. She used a Mudtools paddle with a sock. Link to paddle: <a href="https://mudtools.com/collections/paddles/products/paddle-small-sock">https://mudtools.com/products/paddle-small-sock</a>
- Fettling knife (Dolan is the brand she was using in the webinar)
- Shredder (micro plane rasp)
- A set of round cookie cutters with lots of different size options
- Speedball rubber brayer— 1.5 inch one. This is used to bevel edges instead of cutting. (<a href="www.dickblick.com/products/speedball-soft-rubber-brayers">www.dickblick.com/products/speedball-soft-rubber-brayers</a>)
- Craft foam and tar paper templates of all kinds
- GR pottery forms, studio boards, and foot making tool (<a href="https://grpotteryforms.com/products/work-board-20x16">https://grpotteryforms.com/products/work-board-20x16</a>)
- Drywall boards
- Flairosol spray bottle
- Fineline Precision Applicators (<u>www.dickblick.com/products/fineline-precision-applicators</u>)
- Magic Water. This is used in place of slip for attaching component parts on pieces. Since Bclay has porcelain in it, there is a higher likelihood for stress cracks during drying and the magic water reduces that.
  - The recipe she uses is from Lakeside Pottery: 1 gallon water (distilled), 3 tablespoons of liquid sodium silicate, 1 ½ teaspoons of soda ash.

- She uses an MKM Daisy stamp to add the flowers to her pieces.

**Note:** If you are interested in working along with the workshop, you will need the following: slab of clay, your favorite stamps, red/yellow mudtools ribs, sponge, banding wheel, upholstery foam (not something you have to have, but very handy), slip or magic water/brushes, scoring tool, and something to make holes in the clay.
