MAKING OF A DVD

I love watching potters work. Pottery videos on the web have taught me new techniques, inspired me to try new forms, and provided solutions to technical problems. So a couple of years ago, I decided to share some of my own techniques on the web. Working with my son Alan Smith, we made two short throwing videos that we posted on my website. I was amazed and gratified by how many people wrote to thank me for the new ideas.

Encouraged by that response, Alan and I got together last summer to film a longer piece – Wheel Throwing with Nan Rothwell. Alan and I designed the DVD like a textbook, beginning with basic cylinder and bowl forms and advancing to sections of more elaborate projects. We hope it can work well for beginning throwers and also speak to experienced potters in search of new techniques and ways of looking at form and function.

When we did the first short pieces, Alan shot everything with one camera. That meant that I had to do each project twice – once for the basic camera angle and once for close-up shots. That process created continuity issues for Alan's editing process, as the two pots were not identical. So in making our full length DVD, we used two cameras, one at a fixed distance from the wheel and the other with Alan doing hand-held close shots.

Working in front of the camera proved surprisingly easy. I have always loved teaching, especially in small class settings when I can work one-on-one. I enjoy identifying ways to make throwing easier and to bring finished pots closer to the student's ideal form. I like teaching in larger venues too, but my enjoyment is tempered by performance anxiety. During our filming, I was surprised by how




quickly I could forget the camera was there and just talk with Alan about what I was doing as I worked. It was perfect – no stage fright, and if the pot collapsed or I was inarticulate, I knew that Alan could edit it out.

After we finished filming, Alan spent several months editing the video in consultation with Sherman Hall and Jen Harnetty at Ceramic Arts Daily. Then we passed the project to them for the production and marketing. We both feel really lucky to be working with my friends at CAD. We got to do the fun part and now the CAD team gets to do the business end – an ideal solution. In fact, we enjoyed the process so much that we've just begun writing a storyboard for a companion DVD on glazing and decorating.

Clay and glaze both expand in heat . . . knowing how much can't be beat.

How much they expand they also contract, by the same rate is a general fact.

If glaze contracts more than the clay, after it cools the glaze might craze.

If the clay shrinks more than the glaze, the glaze shivers and crawls in the cooling phase.

Matching clay and glaze to shrink near the same . . . that is our goal. That is our aim.

The distance between cracks can help diagnose if the clay and glaze fit is getting close.

A few cracks far apart is a good sign. Just adding some silica could make your glaze fine.

But you are far from good glaze fit . . . if lots of cracks appear and are very close knit.

To correct this problem you'll need to replace high with low expansion oxides to reduce the craze.

Soda and potash are really great, but they have the highest expansion rates.

For an anti-craze ingredient with a low expansion rate silica, lithia or boric oxide could be really quite great!

Some like crazing while some do not, but it stresses the clay throughout the pot.

Easy to chip, absorbs water too . . . these are some defects crazing brings to you.



QUESTION AND ANSWER WITH FOUNDING MEMBER MARK MECKLENBORG



1 - WHEN AND HOW WERE YOU APPROACHED WITH THE IDEA OF POTTERS COUNCIL?

In 1998 & 1999 I was the publisher of *Ceramics Monthly*.

Bill Jones and I noticed that while NCECA was doing a good job of covering the needs of education and academia, there was a need for another group to help regular potters in their studios.

We got together to create a framework and write a plan. We invited a group of interested potters to visit our Columbus offices in order to get their input.

We presented our finished proposal and had it approved by the American Ceramics Society Board. (Ms.) Chris Schnitzer was the ACerS director of Membership at the time and was also involved in the early stages.

2 - WHY DID YOU FEEL THERE WAS A NEED FOR AN ORGANIZATION LIKE POTTERS COUNCIL?

I knew that NCECA was doing a great job in education, but there was no group addressing the needs of working potters.

3 - WHAT INTEREST OR STRENGTHS DETERMINED THE ROLE YOU PLAYED IN CREATING POTTERS COUNCIL?

I think my biggest strength lay in recognizing the need and making sure it happened.

At this time Bill Jones was involved with *Pottery Making Illustrated*, so he too was aware there was a need for a group to help working studio potters.

He and I stayed involved with the project and kept the momentum going.

4 - WHAT WERE THE BIGGEST OBSTACLES AND CHALLENGES YOU FACED IN CREATING A NEW ORGANIZATION LIKE THIS ONE?

I think the biggest challenge was being a new organization and building our reputation. We needed to bring value to the Membership.

5 - HAS POTTERS COUNCIL BECOME WHAT YOU IMAGINED OR HAS IT SERVED NEW PURPOSES YOU HAD NOT CONSIDERED?

The Potters Council has exceeded our expectations in the area of workshops. We had hoped we could sponsor a few, but the current quality and numbers are far above what we expected.

Carolyn Dorr has been a major force for getting these organized and taking care of the PC Members.

I am also pleased the Insurance is available. We hoped to do this but could not get past the problems of state to state changes.

6 - DO YOU STILL SEE AREAS OF NEED THE POTTERS COUNCIL IS NOT ADDRESSING?

I cannot answer since I am not involved in this area at this time.

7 - WHAT ADVICE FOR THE FUTURE WOULD YOU OFFER THE BOARD?

Keep up the good work!
